Joe Biden to ask Congress to fund Taiwan arms via Ukraine budget

The White House will ask Congress to fund arms for Taiwan as part of a supplemental budget request for Ukraine, in an effort to speed up the supply of weapons to the country amid the rising threat from China. Critics of the current Taiwan strategy have urged Washington to supply weapons more quickly as China increases military activity around the country. The Chinese embassy in Washington said China "firmly opposed US military ties with, and arms provision, to Taiwan", over which Beijing claims sovereignty. It called on Washington to "stop posing risks to peace and stability in the Taiwan Strait."

LandSpace Technology became the world's first private company to launch a methane-liquid oxygen carrier rocket, marking a major breakthrough for China's new low-cost liquid-propellant rockets. The launch, the second try after a failure seven months ago, is crucial for the eight-year-old startup. The market is eagerly seeking a Chinese answer to Elon Musk's SpaceX.

Jinchao Wei, who worked as a machinist's mate at a naval base in San Diego, has been charged with espionage for allegedly sending photos and videos of an amphibious assault ship to a Chinese intelligence officer, as well as technical and mechanical manuals.

China's rivals warn of nuclear build-up, but analysts say Beijing seeks quality over quantity

China's military is focusing its nuclear programme on quality rather than quantity when it comes to warheads, Chinese defence analysts have said, dismissing suggestions that the PLA is embarking on a massive build-up. The assessments follow the release last week of a Japanese defence ministry white paper that said Beijing could quadruple its arsenal to 1,500 warheads by 2035, echoing estimates by the Pentagon in October. Tokyo estimated the People's Liberation Army had 350 nuclear warheads as of last year, while an earlier report by the Federation of American Scientists' Nuclear Information Project estimated Beijing had roughly 410 nuclear warheads and more in production.

China launches new meteorological satellite to provide more accurate forecasts amid climate change

China launched a meteorological satellite for weather forecasting, climate change monitoring and research on atmospheric chemistry. A Long March 4C carrier rocket lifted off at 11:47 am at the Jiuquan Satellite Launch Center in northwestern China and flew about 22 minutes before placing the Fengyun 3F into a sunsynchronous orbit, according to the China National Space Administration. The administration said in a news release that the satellite is equipped with 10 pieces of advanced equipment including a hyperspectral infrared atmospheric sounder, a microwave temperature sounder and a device to measure Earth radiation.

US and China to open communication lines after diplomatic push bears fruit

Philippine military condemns China's use of water cannon in disputed sea

The disputes in the South China Sea, one of the world's busiest sea lanes, have long been regarded as an Asian flashpoint and a delicate fault line in the rivalry between the United States and China in the region.

When the rod hits the target at a speed of Mach 10, a tremendous amount of kinetic energy, similar to that of a nuclear weapon, would be released.

Since the visit of then-U.S. Speaker Nancy Pelosi to Taiwan last August, China has stepped up its aggressive actions toward the island, expanding military drills and crossing over the median line with daily flyovers. President Xi Jinping has said China will strive for peaceful unification but has also noted Beijing "will never promise to renounce the use of force." Being a close neighbor to Taiwan, Aso said, "We should be the very first one to express our attitude and also to make that message clear to the international community, including China."

Tritium in Chinese nuclear wastewater above Fukushima levels

The amount of radioactive tritium in wastewater from Chinese nuclear plants, recorded at 13 of the nation's monitoring points in 2021, surpassed the maximum allowable annual amount of the material contained in treated water set to be released from the Fukushima No. 1 plant, according to public data. Beijing has been opposed to Tokyo's plan to begin releasing treated radioactive water from the crippled Fukushima plant into the sea and has tightened controls on seafood imports from Japan.

Biden orders ban on new investments in China's sensitive high-tech industries

The order will prohibit venture capital and private equity firms from pumping more money into Chinese efforts to develop semiconductors and other microelectronics, quantum computers and certain artificial intelligence applications. Administration officials stressed that the move was tailored to guard national security, but China is likely to see it as part of a wider campaign to contain its rise.
