"We are now developing a new system that uses nuclear energy to address the moon station's long-term, high-power energy demands," Wu Weiren, chief designer of the Chinese lunar exploration programme, told state broadcaster CCTV. He did not give technical details about the nuclear reactor being built, but previous reports said it could generate 1 megawatt of electricity, which is enough to power hundreds of homes for a year.

Satellite images show increased activity at nuclear test sites in Russia, China and US

Russia, the United States and China have all built new facilities and dug new tunnels at their nuclear test sites in recent years, satellite images obtained exclusively by CNN show, at a time when tensions between the three major nuclear powers have risen to their highest in decades. One is operated by China in the far western region of Xinjiang, one by Russia in an Arctic Ocean

archipelago, and another in the US in the Nevada desert. "There are really a lot of hints that we're seeing that suggest Russia, China and the United States might resume nuclear testing," he said, something none of those countries have done since underground nuclear testing was banned by the 1996 Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty. "The Chinese test site is different than the Russian test site," Lewis said. "The Chinese test site is vast, and there are many different parts of it." "(It) looks really busy, and these things are easily seen in satellite imagery. If we can see them, I think the US government certainly can," he added.

Philippines dismantles Chinese floating barrier at Scarborough Shoal

The Philippines said it executed a "special operation" to remove a floating barrier installed by China at a prime fishing patch in the South China Sea, a move that could stoke tension after a yearslong detente in Asia's most disputed waters. The Philippines expressed outrage and shared images of the Chinese Coast Guard policing a long, ball-buoy barrier near the Scarborough Shoal, a rocky outcrop 200 kilometers from the Philippines and the site of years of intermittent flare-ups over sovereignty and fishing rights. Hours after the national security adviser had vowed to take action, the Philippine Coast Guard said it had removed the floating cordon, at the behest of President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. and his special task force on the South China Sea.

In a general debate speech delivered at the meeting, the Chinese representative referred to the treated water from Tokyo Electric Power Company Holdings's plant in Fukushima Prefecture as "nuclear-contaminated water," and reiterated the country's opposition to the discharge. "There is great uncertainty of the accumulated oceanic effects of the large amount of radionuclides discharged into the sea," the representative said, arguing that Japan was not providing sufficient information.

China has world's second largest number of nuclear power units

China has the second-largest number of nuclear power units in operation or under construction in the world, according to the China Nuclear Energy Association. The Chinese mainland has 55 nuclear power units in operation with a combined installed capacity of 57 gigawatts (GW) and 24 units under construction with a total installed capacity of 27.8 GW, Wang Binghua, an official at the association, told a meeting in Shenzhen, south China's Guangdong Province. The Chinese mainland has approved 21 new nuclear power units since 2021, said Wang, adding that six to eight nuclear power units are expected to be greenlighted annually within the foreseeable future.

China expects to greenlight six to eight new nuclear power units a year within the foreseeable future, an official at the China Nuclear Energy Association (CNEA) said, according to a report in state media outlet Xinhua. China is looking to develop its nuclear power sector as part of a broader push on renewables and domestic energy security. Nuclear is expected to contribute about 10 percent of power generation in the country by 2035 and 18 percent by 2060, with a total generation capacity of 400 gigawatts (GW) by 2060, the CNEA said.

the near side of the moon. The far side is generally older and contains the Aitken Basin, one of the three major lunar landforms, making it of significant scientific value, according to the CNSA.
